PERSONAL REFLECTIONS

Past and Future

Find a quiet place to reflect on the following series of questions. A Catholic church, an Adoration chapel, a coffee shop, or your favorite spot to relax would be good. No need to answer every question perfectly, entirely, or in order. They're just there to spark your thoughts. Invite the Holy Spirit to be with you and then respond to whatever he places on your mind and heart.

Describe one day or memory from your childhood that you wish you could relive o reexperience. Was it perfect, or would you change anything about it?
What would you say to God now about that day or memory?
Who had the biggest impact on your faith while growing up? What did they do that inspired your faith?
What was something difficult you had to overcome while growing up? How did you do it?
Did you believe God was with you in this struggle? Why did or why didn't it seem like he was with you?

VISIO DIVINA

Like *Lectio Divina*, the prayer experience known as *Visio Divina* ("divine vision") is imaginative and immerses us in a sacred scene. In *Lectio*, we meditate on Sacred Scripture. In *Visio*, we meditate on sacred art. There are countless religious images from throughout the centuries that can move our hearts and minds to more deeply experience God's love.

Find a comfortable, quiet place to pray with the image below for ten minutes. If you have more time, bring your Bible with you to look up the bolded passages. Begin with the Sign of the Cross and ask the Holy Spirit to be present with you.

"L'Innocence" by William-Adolphe Bouguereau

In this oil painting, the Blessed Virgin Mary holds her child Jesus in one arm and an unblemished lamb in the other — three completely innocent figures. The white lamb not only represents purity but also foreshadows the sacrifice of Jesus who is "the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!" (John 1:29) The painting serves as an invitation for us to become holy, too. The Lord says in Isaiah 1:18, "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red like crimson, they shall become like wool."

SCRIPTURE REFLECTIONS

Reading

In your Bible, turn to and read **Ephesians 2:10** two or three times.

Reflection

In his letter to the Ephesians, St. Paul is trying to explain to the people of Ephesus that following Jesus and being a part of his Church are inseparable. It's not enough just to "know" Jesus, but you have to do something with that relationship and be in relationship with his body of believers on earth (which we call the Church). Step One is to develop your relationship with Christ. Step Two is to see what he uniquely calls you to do with your life and how you can help build the Kingdom of heaven here on earth.

In this yerse, the Holy Spirit prompts St. Paul to say that YOU (not just the Ephesians but

you, personally) are God's "handiwork" (or "workmanship" in some translations). That means God created you with precision, intentionality, purpose, and care. There is not one detail about you externally or one blessing within you that is a mistake. What does this tell you about God, and how does that make you feel?
What are some of your gifts, talents, and skills? Don't be falsely humble here. Actually list some of your God-given gifts and talents now.

Biography

Saint Carlo Acutis was born in London, England on May 3rd, 1991 to wealthy Italian parents Andrea Acutis and Antonia Salzano. He was the first child born to his parents and lived his entire life as an only child. He was raised in Italy, where he embraced the Catholic faith more ardently than his parents. Carlo was granted special permission from his spiritual director and archbishop to receive his first Communion earlier than the usual age.

He attended a Jesuit classical high school where he kept up with a demanding course load. As a young teenager, Carlo showed an aptitude for computer programming and was well-liked by his classmates. He volunteered as a teacher of Catechism classes for children preparing for Confirmation, and managed his parish's website.
