As we shall see, the path of the Christian life is riddled with many trials, dangers, and obstacles. Yet, the journey to the Celestial City is also laden with displays of God's grace and faithfulness. As we begin our study of Bunyan's masterpiece, Dr. Derek Thomas will direct our attention to the City of Destruction, the starting point for Christian's spiritual journey and ours.

- 1. To introduce John Bunyan's classic work *Pilgrim's Progress* and discuss its importance in the lives of generations of Christians.
- 2. To describe certain events in the early life of John Bunyan that are helpful in understanding this work as his spiritual autobiography.
- 3. To communicate the burdening nature of sin and the gravity of future judgment.
- 4. To chronicle the beginning of Christian's spiritual journey, with its ties to Bunyan's experiences and those of believers today.

LECTURE OUTLINE

I. The Legacy of Pilgrim's Progress

- A. After the Bible, John Bunyan's *Pilgrim's Progress* is the most published book in the history of the English language.
 - i. For many generations, it has been read in Christian homes around the world.
 - ii. Many names of characters and locations in Pilgrim's Progress have become common phrases in English literature and everyday speech.
- B. Pilgrim's Progress contains two parts.
 - i. Part One, based largely on Bunyan's own experiences, relates Christian's journey to the Celestial City.
 - ii. Part Two is the lesser-known story of Christian's wife, Christiana, and their children as they undertake a similar journey.

II. A Man, a Book, and a Burden

- A. Pilgrim's Progress begins with a man who is in a state of distress.
 - i. As a resident of the City of Destruction, this man carries a great burden of sin upon his back.
 - ii. While reading from a book, this man was awakened to his state of spiritual peril.
- B. This man's conviction of sin parallels Bunyan's own spiritual awakening.
 - i. John Bunyan came of age during the turbulent period surrounding the English Civil War.
 - ii. As a young man, he was self-absorbed, vulgar, and hostile to God.
 - iii. Through the influence of his wife and others who confronted his sin, Bunyan slowly came to a realization of his need for salvation.

III. Toward the Wicket Gate

- A. Evangelist gave this man direction and encouragement in his state of distress.
 - i. This man, Christian, wanted to escape from judgment but did not know where to go.
 - ii. Evangelist instructed Christian to follow a shining light, which would lead him to a wicket gate.
- B. Christian left his family and home behind, covered his ears, and began running toward the light.
- C. Though he could not yet see the gate itself, he was eager to be freed from his burden and spared from the judgment that would befall the City of Destruction.


- 1. Have you read *Pilgrim's Progress*? If so, what do you recall most vividly about it? If not, what are you most interested in learning from your study of this book?

We want to see men and women around the world connect the deep truths of the Christian faith to everyday life.












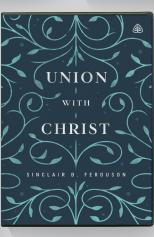
