
# LEVEL 1-BEGINNER KNIT HAT lion brand® lion's pride® woolspun®

#### MATERIALS

- LION BRAND<sup>®</sup> LION'S PRIDE<sup>®</sup> WOOLSPUN<sup>®</sup> (Art. #671) #150 Oxford Grey 1 ball (A) #149 Charcoal 1 ball (B) or colors of your choice
- LION BRAND<sup>®</sup> knitting needles size 10.5 (6.5 mm)
- LION BRAND® large-eyed blunt needle

# SIZE

Finished Circumference About 19 in. (48.5 cm), stretches to fit



### GAUGE

12 sts + 24 rows = about 4 in. (10 cm) in Garter stitch (knit every row). BE SURE TO CHECK YOUR GAUGE.

# NOTES

- 1. Two Squares are worked in easy Garter stitch (knit every stitch on every row) and stripes.
- 2. The stripes are made by alternating 2 colors of yarn. To change color, just drop the old color then pick up the new color and start knitting with it, leaving a long yarn tail for weaving in.
- 3. When working the striped section, carry the yarn you're not using along the side edge of the Square until you need it again.
- 4. Squares are sewn together, then one edge is gathered to make Hat.




**Square 1** With A, cast on 28 stitches.



STEP 2


With A, work in Garter stitch (knit every row) for 6 rows. \*With B, work in Garter stitch for 4 rows; with A, work in Garter stitch for 4 rows; repeat from \* 5 more times; then with B, work in Garter stitch for 4 rows. Bind off.



### STEP 4


Sew Squares together.





#### STEP 5

Thread needle with a length of either color yarn and weave in and out of one edge of Hat.




### STEP 3

#### Square 2

With B, cast on 28 stitches. With B, work in Garter stitch for 4 rows.


\*With A, work in Garter stitch for 2 rows; with B, work in Garter stitch for 2 rows; repeat from \*11 more times; with A, work in Garter stitch for 4 rows. Bind off.

#### STEP 6

Pull yarn to gather, then knot to secure. Weave in yarn ends.
