 Additional Materials 3 in. (7.5 cm) plastic canvas precut heart shapes, 2

Folded card, about 5 x 7 in. (12.5 x 18

cm) Craft glue \*Bonbons (Article #601).

**Cotton:** 100% Cotton. **Care:** Machine Wash Cool, Gentle Cycle, Do Not Bleach, Dry Flat, Low Iron, Dry Clean Any Solvent Except Trichloroethylene.

**Acrylic:** 100% Acrylic. **Care:** Machine Wash and Dry, Do Not Bleach, Do Not Iron, Tumble Dry Normal, Dry Clean and Solvent Except Trichloroethylene.

Metallic: 96% Acrylic, 4% Metallic Polyester. Care: Machine Wash Cool, Lay Flat to Dry, Do Not Bleach, Do Not Iron, Dry Clean Any Solvent Except Trichloroethylene.; package size:

Cotton: Weight Category 2: Sport Weight

8 x .35oz/10g 8 x 28yd/26m

3 in. (7.5 cm) plastic Acrylic: Weight Category 3: DK Weight

8 x .35oz/10g 8 x 28yd/26m

Metallic: Weight Category 2: Sport Weight

8 x .35oz/10g 8 x 38.3 yd/35m



Exact gauge is not essential to this project.

#### NOTES:

- 1. Precut plastic canvas hearts are embroidered then glued to a card.
- 2. Embroidery is worked in simple stitches. Follow the stitch guide for how to work the stitches and follow the chart for stitch placement and yarn color.
- 3. Use yarn colors as desired!
- 4. We show the hearts glued onto a card, but they can be used in many ways tied onto packages or wreaths for example.

#### YARN COLORS

Celebrate: Hot Pink (A)



Jingle Bells: White with Silver Sparkle (B)

### HEART I Embroidery

#### Notes:


- 1. Use a doubled strand of yarn threaded into blunt needle to embroider.
- 2. Leave the 2 border threads around the outside edge of the canvas unworked.

**Row 1:** With A and following chart, work a cross stitch over the first thread at lower point of heart, above the 2 border threads.

**Row 2:** With A and following chart, work cross stitches over the next thread all the way across the heart. Repeat Row 2 to top of heart, leaving the 2 border threads unworked.

Cross Stitch - This stitch is worked over an intersection of threads. Each stitch is worked completely before going on to the next. The direction of the top stitch may vary, but all stitches on a stitched piece should be made in the same direction.





### **French Knots**

With a doubled strand of B and following chart, make French Knots over the cross stitches.


French Knot - This stitch can be worked over a thread. Bring needle up through one hole and back down through a different hole.



#### **Borders**

With a doubled strand of A, work overcast stitch around the inner border thread. With a doubled strand of B, work overcast stitch around the outer border thread.

Overcast Stitch - This stitch is used to cover the edge of the canvas or to join pieces of canvas. You may need to go through the same hole more than once to get even coverage on the edge, especially at the corners.



#### **HEART II**

Make same as Heart I, using B instead of A for the cross stitch center and inner border; and A instead of B for the French knots and outer border.

#### **FINISHING**

Glue hearts to card.
