#### MATERIALS

- 790-411 Lion Brand Homespun Yarn: Mixed Berries 4 5 Balls
  - Lion Brand Crochet Hook - Size N-13 (9 mm)
  - Lion Brand Split Ring Stitch Markers
  - Lion Brand Large-Eye Blunt Needles (Set of 6)
- \*Homespun® (Article #790). 98% Acrylic, 2% Polyester; package size: 6.00oz/170.00 gr. (185yds/169m) pull skeins*



#### GAUGE:

Seven 3-dc groups + 8 rows = about 8 in. (20.5 cm) in Poncho pattern.

7 1/2 sc + 8 rows = about 4 in. (10 cm).

When you match the gauge in a pattern, your project will be the size specified in the pattern and the materials specified in the pattern will be sufficient. The needle or hook size called for in the pattern is based on what the designer used, but it is not unusual for gauge to vary from person to person. If it takes you fewer stitches and rows to make your swatch, try using a smaller size hook or needles; if more stitches and rows, try a larger size hook or needles.

Making a Gauge Swatch

#### STITCH EXPLANATION:

**Shell** (2 dc, ch 1, 2 dc) in indicated sp.

#### NOTES:

1. Poncho is worked in one piece beg at neck edge.
2. Poncho is worked in joined rnds of 3-dc groups. 3-dc groups are worked into the sps between 3-dc groups instead of directly into sts. A ch-sp is worked at the beg and middle of each rnd. Increases are worked into the ch-sps to form the front and back points and add more 3-dc groups.
3. The last 4 rnds are worked in a lacy Edging pattern.
4. If you find it difficult to join the beg ch into a ring without twisting the ch, Rnd 1 can be worked as a row, then joined into a rnd, as follows: Leaving a long beg tail, ch 47 (51), 2 dc in 4th ch from hook (3 skipped ch count as first dc), \*sk next ch, 3 dc in next ch; rep from \* to last ch, sk last ch; join with sl st in top of beg ch, sl st in next 2 dc – 22 (24) 3-dc groups. Use beg tail to sew gap at base of first row closed. Proceed

to Rnd 2.

5. Stitch diagrams are provided to illustrate the 3-dc Poncho pattern and the lacy Edging pattern.

## PONCHO

Ch 44 (48) loosely. Being careful not to twist ch; join with sl st in first ch to make a ring.

**Rnd 1 (RS):** Ch 3 (counts as first dc), \*sk next ch, 3 dc in next ch; rep from \* to last ch, sk last ch, 2 dc in same ch as beg; join with sl st in top of beg ch – you will have 22 (24) 3-dc groups.

**Rnd 2:** Sl st in sp between beg ch and next dc, ch 4 (counts as dc, ch 1), 3 dc in same sp, (3 dc in next sp between 3-dc groups) 10 (11) times, (3 dc, ch 1, 3 dc) in next sp between 3-dc groups for point, (3 dc in next sp between 3-dc groups) 10 (11) times, 2 dc in same sp as beg; join with sl st in 3rd ch of beg ch to complete beg point – 24 (26) 3-dc groups and a ch-1 sp at each of the 2 points.

**Rnd 3:** Sl st in beg ch-sp, ch 4 (counts as dc, ch 1), 3 dc in same ch-sp, (3 dc in next sp between 3-dc groups) 11 (12) times, (3 dc, ch 1, 3 dc) in ch-1 sp of point, (3 dc in next sp between 3-dc groups) 11 (12) times, 2 dc in same ch-sp as beg; join with sl st in 3rd ch of beg ch – 26 (28) 3-dc groups and a ch-1 sp at each of the 2 points.

**Rnd 4:** Sl st in beg ch-sp, ch 4 (counts as dc, ch 1), 3 dc in same ch-sp, 3 dc in each sp between 3-dc groups to ch-1 sp at next point, (3 dc, ch 1, 3 dc) in ch-1 sp of point, 3 dc in each sp between 3-dc groups to end of rnd, 2 dc in same ch-sp as beg; join with sl st in 3rd ch of beg ch – 28 (30) 3-dc groups and a ch-1 sp at each of the 2 points.

Rep Rnd 4 until there are 60 (78) 3-dc groups and 2 ch-1 sps at points or to 2 in. (5 cm) less than desired length.

**Note:** So that you can do the Edging, make sure that the number of 3-dc groups you have is evenly divisible by 6.

## EDGING

**Rnd 1:** Sl st in beg ch-sp, ch 4 (counts as dc, ch 1), 2 dc in same space, ch 3, sk next 2 dc, sc in each of next 5 dc, \*ch 3, sk next 2 dc, (2 dc, ch 1, 2 dc) in next sp between 3-dc groups (Shell made), ch 3, sk next 2 dc, sc in each of next 5 dc; rep from \* to last 2 dc, ch 3, sk last 2 dc, dc in same ch-sp as beg; join with sl st in 3rd ch of beg ch – 20 (26) Shells. **Note:** When working Rnd 1, the next sp between 3-dc groups may be a ch-1 sp at a point. Work (2 dc, ch 1, 2 dc) into the ch-1 sp the same as working into a standard sp between 3-dc groups.

**Rnd 2:** Sl st in beg ch-sp, ch 4 (counts as dc, ch 1), Shell in same ch-sp, ch 3, sk next ch-3 sp, sk next sc, sc in next 3 sc, \*ch 3, sk next sc, sk next ch-3 sp, (Shell, ch 1, Shell) in ch-1 sp of next Shell, ch 3, sk next ch-3 sp, sk next sc, sc in next 3 sc; rep from \* to last sc, ch 3, sk last sc, sk last ch-3 sp, (2 dc, ch 1, dc) in same ch-sp as beg; join with sl st in 3rd ch of beg ch – 40 (52) Shells.

**Rnd 3:** Sl st in beg ch-sp, ch 4 (counts as dc, ch 1), 2 dc in same ch-sp, Shell in ch-1 sp of next Shell, ch 3, sk next ch-3 sp, sk next sc, sc in next sc, \*ch 3, sk next sc, sk next ch-3 sp, Shell in each of next 3 ch-1 sps, ch 3, sk next ch-3 sp, sk next sc, sc in next sc; rep from \* to last sc, ch 3, sk last sc, sk last ch-3 sp, Shell in ch-1 sp of last Shell, dc in same ch-sp as beg; join with sl st in 3rd ch of beg ch – 60 (78) Shells.

**Rnd 4:** Sl st in beg ch-sp, ch 4 (counts as dc, ch 1), 2 dc in same ch-sp, ch 1, Shell in ch-1 sp of next Shell, ch 3, sk next ch-3 sp, sc in next sc, \*ch 3, sk next ch-3 sp, Shell in ch-1 sp of next Shell, (ch 1, Shell in ch-1 sp of next Shell) twice, ch 3, sk next ch-3 sp, sc in next sc; rep from \* to last ch-3 sp, ch 3, sk last ch-3 sp, Shell in ch-1 sp of last Shell, ch 1, dc in same ch-sp as beg; join with slip st in 3rd ch of beg ch.

Fasten off.

## FINISHING

### Collar

**Rnd 1:** From RS, working across opposite side of foundation ch at neck edge, join yarn with sc in any ch, then sc in each ch around; do not join, work in a spiral – 44 (48) sc.

Place a marker in last sc made to indicate end of rnd.

Move marker up as each rnd is completed.

**Rnd 2:** Sc in each sc around.

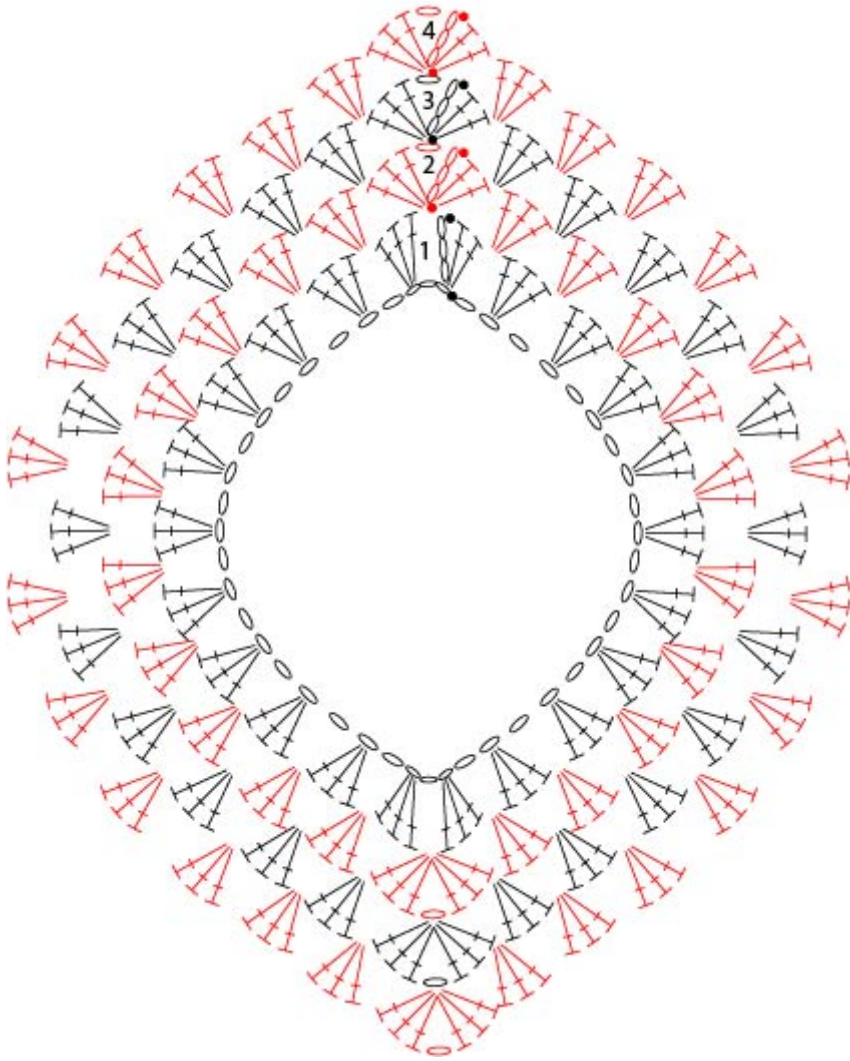
Rep Rnd 2 three more times or until Collar is desired height.

**Last Rnd:** Sc in each sc around; join with sl st in first sc.

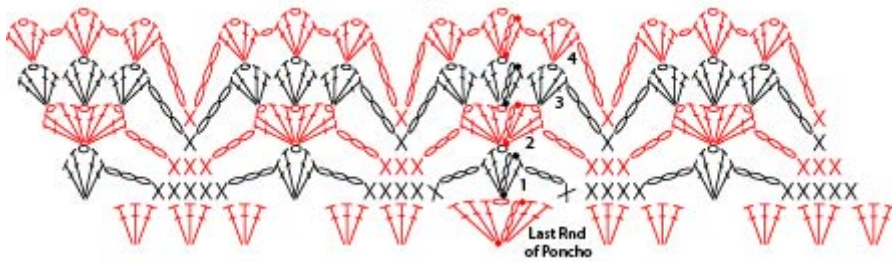
Fasten off.

Weave in ends.
