• 860-125 Lion Brand Vanna's Choice Yarn: Taupe 1 Ball (A) • 860-099 Lion Brand Vanna's Choice Yarn: Linen 1 Ball (B) *Vanna's Choice® (Article #860). 100% • 860-130 Lion Brand Vanna's Premium Acrylic Choice Yarn: Honey 400, 401, 403: 92% Acrylic, 8% Rayon 1 Ball (C) 402: 96% Acrylic, 4% Rayon; package • 860-158 Lion Brand Vanna's size: Solids: 3.5 oz (100 g), 170 yards Choice Yarn: Mustard (156 m)1 Ball (D) Prints, Tweeds, & Heathers: 3 ozs (85 • 860-151 Lion Brand Vanna's g), 145 yards (133 meters) Choice Yarn: Charcoal Grey Twists: 2.5 oz (70 g), 121 yards (111 1 Ball (E) *meters*) • 860-149 Lion Brand Vanna's Choice Yarn: Silver Grey 1 Ball (F) • Lion Brand Crochet Hook -Size K-10.5 (6.5 mm) • Lion Brand Large-Eye Blunt Needles (Set of 6)

GAUGE:

1 ripple = about 5 1/2 in. (14 cm) measured from peak to peak.

When you match the <u>gauge</u> in a pattern, your project will be the size specified in the pattern and the materials specified in the pattern will be sufficient. The needle or hook size called for in the pattern is based on what the designer used, but it is not unusual for gauge to vary from person to person. If it takes you fewer stitches and rows to make your swatch, try using a smaller size hook or needles; if more stitches and rows, try a larger size hook or needles.


Making a Gauge Swatch

NOTES:

1. The Lapghan (a fun name for a small afghan) is worked in a ripple crochet pattern. The ripple pattern is easy to do, but it's important to remember that you may need to work several rows before the ripple pattern becomes clear.

2. The ripple pattern consists of alternating 3-st "peaks" and skipped st "valleys". Take care to keep the peaks and valleys of each row aligned. 3 sts are worked into the center st of peaks, and sts are skipped over valleys.

3. When working a crochet ripple, your piece may not lay flat until you've worked a few rows. 4. To change color, work last st of old color to last yarn over. Yarn over with new color and draw through all loops on hook to complete the st. Fasten off old color. Proceed with new color.





STRIPE SEQUENCE

Work 2 rows each with A, B, C, D, E, F; (4 rows each with A, B, C, D, E, F) twice; then 2 rows each with A, B, C, D, E, and F.

LAPGHAN

With A, ch 98. **Row 1:** Work 2 sc in 2nd ch from hook, *sc in next 7 ch, sk next ch, sc in next 7 ch, 3 sc in next ch; rep

from * to last 16 ch, sc in next 7 ch, sk next ch, sc in next 7 ch, 2 sc in last ch – 6 ripples. **Row 2:** Ch 3 (counts as first dc), turn, dc in first sc, *dc in next 7 sc, sk next 2 sc, dc in next 7 sc, 3 dc in next sc; rep from * to last 17 sts, dc in next 7 sc, sk next 2 sc, dc in next 7 sc, 2 dc in last sc. Change to next color in Stripe Sequence in the last st.

Row 3: Ch 1, turn, 2 sc in first dc, *sc in next 7 dc, sk next 2 dc, sc in next 7 dc, 3 sc in next dc; rep from * to last 17 sts, sc in next 7 dc, sk next 2 dc, sc in next 7 dc, 2 sc in top of turning ch.

Rep Rows 2 and 3, changing color following Stripe Sequence, until all 72 rows of Stripe Sequence have been worked.

Fasten off.

FINISHING

Weave in ends.
