- 860-130 Lion Brand Vanna's Choice Yarn: Honey 1 Ball
- Lion Brand Knitting Needles -Size 7 [4.5 mm]
- Lion Brand Large-Eye Blunt Needles (Set of 6)
- Additional Materials Small amount of fiberfill stuffing Small amount of catnip Small amount of white yarn

MATERIALS NOTE

Materials are sufficient to make multiple Toys.

*Vanna's Choice® (Article #860). 100% Premium Acrylic 400, 401, 403: 92% Acrylic, 8% Rayon 402: 96% Acrylic, 4% Rayon; package size: Solids:

Prints, Tweeds, & Heathers: 3 ozs (85 g), 145 yards (133 meters)

3.5 oz (100 g), 170 yards (156 m)

Twists: 2.5 oz (70 g), 121 yards (111 meters)



GAUGE:

Exact gauge is not essential to this project.

NOTES:

- 1. Pretzel is worked flat, then sewn into a tube and stuffed.
- 2. Tube is twisted into Pretzel shape, and 'salt' is embroidered using French Knots.
- 3. We used a smaller needle than usual for this yarn to create a dense fabric for this toy.

PRETZEL

Cast on 9 stitches. Row 1 (Right Side): Knit. Row 2: Purl. Repeat Rows 1 and 2 until piece measures about 17 in. (18 cm) from beginning. Bind off, leaving a long yarn tail.

FINISHING

Thread yarn tail into blunt needle and sew long sides of piece together to make a tube, stuffing lightly as you go with fiberfill and catnip. Sew ends of tube closed. Fold ends of tube, crossing ends to create a pretzel shape.

Sew a few stitches through where the pieces cross to hold the shape.

With white yarn, embroider French Knot 'salt' on Pretzel.

Weave in ends.
