Front-panel features and indicators




Figure 1. Front-panel features and indicators—8 hard drive system




Figure 2. Front-panel features and indicators—10 hard drive system

Lcd panel features

i NOTE: The LCD panel is not supported in the 10-hard drive system.

The system's LCD panel provides system information and status and error messages to indicate when the system is operating correctly or when the system needs attention. See LCD Error Messages for information about specific error codes.

- · The LCD backlight lights blue during normal operating conditions and lights amber to indicate an error condition.
- The LCD backlight is off when the system is in standby mode and can be turned on by pressing either the Select, Left, or Right button on the LCD panel.
- The LCD backlight remains off if LCD messaging is turned off through the iDRAC utility, the LCD panel, or other tools.




Figure 3. Lcd panel features

Home screen

The Home screen displays user-configurable information about the system. This screen is displayed during normal system operation when there are no status messages or errors. When the system is in standby mode, the LCD backlight turns off after five minutes of inactivity if there are no error messages. Press one of the three navigation buttons (Select, Left, or Right) to view the Home screen.

To navigate to the Home screen from another menu, continue to select the up arrow $\hat{\mathbf{l}}$ until the Home icon $\hat{\mathbf{r}}$ is displayed, and then select the Home icon.

From the Home screen, press the Select button to enter the main menu.

Setup menu

(i) NOTE: When you select an option in the Setup menu, you must confirm the option before proceeding to the next action.

Option	Description
iDRAC	Select DHCP or Static IP to configure the network mode. If Static IP is selected, the available fields are IP , Subnet (Sub) , and Gateway (Gtw) . Select Setup DNS to enable DNS and to view domain addresses. Two separate DNS entries are available.
Set error	Select SEL to display LCD error messages in a format that matches the IPMI description in the SEL. This is useful when trying to match an LCD message with an SEL entry.

Option Description

Select **Simple** to display LCD error messages in a simplified user-friendly description. See the *Dell Event and Error*

Messages Reference Guide at dell.com/esmmanuals for the list of messages in this format.

Set home Select the default information to be displayed on the LCD Home screen. See View Menu to see the options and

option items that can be set as the default on the Home screen.

View menu

(i) NOTE: When you select an option in the View menu, you must confirm the option before proceeding to the next action.

Option

iDRAC IP

Displays the IPv4 or IPv6 addresses for the iDRAC7. Addresses include DNS (Primary and Secondary), Gateway, IP, and Subnet (IPv6 does not have Subnet).

MAC

Displays the MAC addresses for iDRAC, iSCSI, or Network devices.

Name

Displays the name of the Host, Model, or User String for the system

Number

Displays the Asset tag or the Service tag for the system.

Power

Displays the power output of the system in BTU/hr or Watts. The display format can be configured in the Set home submenu of the Setup menu.

Temperature Displays the temperature of the system in Celsius or Fahrenheit. The display format can be configured in the Set

home submenu of the Setup menu.

Configuring iDRAC from the LCD panel

The LCD panel on the front bezel (optional) has these three buttons for selecting, changing, and entering data:

- ✓ = Enter
- < = Move the selection to the left or decrease the value (depending on the context)</p>
- > = Move the selection to the right or increase the value (depending on the context)

We can assign iDRAC IP address by using LifeCycle controller, BIOS, and from the LCD panel.

1 NOTE: Changing iDRAC IP from the LCD panel will only be available on system with optional front bezel with LCD panel.

- 1 Press \checkmark to enter the system menu.
- 2 Press > to select **Setup** and then press **V**.
- 3 Select **iDRAC**, and press \checkmark .
- 4 Press > to select **StaticIP** and press **V**.
 - NOTE: The LCD panel might display a default IP address. You need to change the numbers that differ from the static IP address you want to assign.
- 5 Press > until you have selected a number that you want to change and then press ✓ to set the number.
- 6 Press > to increase the value or < to decrease the value. When the correct number is displayed, press ✓.
- 7 Repeat steps 5 and 6 for each additional number you need to change.
- 8 When the static IP address is correct, press \gt until \gt is selected, and then press \lor .
- 9 The LCD shows the default subnet mask (Sub). Use the instructions in steps 5 and 6 to modify values as needed.
- 10 Press > until > is selected, and then press \checkmark .
- 11 The LCD shows the default gateway IP address. Use the instructions in steps 5 and 6 to modify values as needed.

- 12 Press > until > is selected, and then press \checkmark .
- 13 The LCD displays if you want to set up DNS. This is recommended, as setting up DNS enables you to program network resources on the iDRAC based on DNS names, rather than requiring you to enter IP addresses.
 - a If you do not want to set up DNS, select **No** and press \checkmark . Then select **Save** and press \checkmark . configuration is complete.
 - b To set up DNS, select Yes, press V, and continue to the next step.
- 14 The default DNS address (D1) is displayed on the LCD panel. Use the instructions in steps 5 and 6 to modify values as required.
- The LCD panel displays the default address for an alternate DNS server (D2). An alternate server is optional, however provides redundancy in case the primary DNS server fails. Use the instructions in steps 5 and 6 to modify values as required. If you do not want to configure an alternate server, set all values to zeros.
- 16 When prompted to save, select **Yes** and press .
 - NOTE: Settings are not applied until you press Yes to save. Also the display eventually times out and all unsaved configuration changes are lost.

Diagnostic indicators

The diagnostic indicators on the system front panel display error status during system startup.

- (i) NOTE: The diagnostic indicators are not present if the system is equipped with an LCD display.
- (i) NOTE: The diagnostic indicators are present only on the 10-hard drive system.

The following section describes system conditions and possible corrective actions associated with these indicators:

Electrical indicator

Condition

Corrective Action

The indicator blinks amber if the system experiences an electrical error (for example, voltage out of range, or a failed power supply or voltage regulator).

See the System Event Log or system messages for the specific issue. If it is due to a problem with the power supply, check the LED on the power supply. Re-seat the power supply by removing and reinstalling it. If the problem persists, see Getting Help.

Temperature indicator

Condition

Corrective Action

The indicator blinks amber if the system experiences a thermal error (for example, a temperature out of range or fan failure). Ensure that none of the following conditions exist:

- A cooling fan is removed or has failed.
- System cover, cooling shroud, EMI filler panel, memory-module blank, or back-filler bracket is removed.
- · Ambient temperature is too high.
- · External airflow is obstructed.

Condition Corrective Action

The indicator blinks amber if a memory error occurs.

See the system event log or system messages for the location of the failed memory.

Reinstall the memory device. If the problem persists, see Getting Help.




Figure 5. Back-panel features and indicators—8 hard drive system (2 pcie expansion cards)





Figure 6. Back-panel features and indicators—10 hard drive system and 8 hard drive system (3 pcie expansion cards)

Power Indicator Codes

Each AC power supply has an illuminated translucent handle and each DC power supply (when available) has an LED that serves as an indicator to show whether power is present or whether a power fault has occurred.




Figure 8. AC Power Supply Status Indicator

1 AC power supply status indicator/handle




Figure 9. DC Power Supply Status Indicator

Power Indicator Pattern	Condition
Not lit	Power is not connected.
Green	The handle/LED indicator lights green indicating that a valid power source is connected to the power supply and that the power supply is operational.
Flashing amber	Indicates a problem with the power supply.

- CAUTION: When correcting a power supply mismatch, replace only the power supply with the flashing indicator. Swapping the opposite power supply to make a matched pair can result in an error condition and unexpected system shutdown. To change from a High Output configuration to a Low Output configuration or vice versa, you must power down the system.
- CAUTION: AC power supplies support both 220 V and 110 V input voltages with the exception of Titanium power supplies, which support only 220 V. When two identical power supplies receive different input voltages, they can output different wattages, and trigger a mismatch.
- CAUTION: If two power supplies are used, they must be of the same type and have the same maximum output power.

Power Indicator Pattern Condition

AUTION: Combining AC and DC power supplies is not supported and triggers a mismatch.

Flashing green

When hot-adding a power supply, this indicates that the power supply is mismatched with the other power supply (in terms of efficiency, feature set, health status, and supported voltage). Replace the power supply that has the flashing indicator with a power supply that matches the capacity of the other installed power supply.

Using the system setup and boot manager

System Setup enables you to manage your system hardware and specify BIOS-level options.

The following keystrokes provide access to system features during startup:

Table 1. System setup keystrokes

Keystroke	Description
<f2></f2>	Opens the System Setup page.
<f10></f10>	Opens and starts Lifecycle Controller, which supports systems management features such as operating system deployment, hardware diagnostics, firmware updates, and platform configuration, using a GUI. The feature set available in Lifecycle Controller is determined by the iDRAC license installed.
<f11></f11>	Opens the BIOS Boot Manager or the Unified Extensible Firmware Interface (UEFI) Boot Manager, depending on the boot configuration of the system.
<f12></f12>	Starts Preboot Execution Environment (PXE) boot.

From System Setup, you can:

- · Change the NVRAM settings after you add or remove hardware
- · View the system hardware configuration
- · Enable or disable integrated devices
- Set performance and power management thresholds
- · Manage system security

You can access System Setup using the:

- · Standard graphical browser, which is enabled by default
- Text browser, which is enabled using Console Redirection

To enable Console Redirection, in System Setup, select System BIOS > Serial Communication screen > Serial Communication, select On with Console Redirection.

(i) NOTE: By default, help text for the selected field is displayed in the graphical browser. To view the help text in the text browser, press <F1>.

Choosing the system boot mode

System Setup enables you to specify one of the following boot modes for installing your operating system:

- · BIOS boot mode (the default) is the standard BIOS-level boot interface.
- Unified Extensible Firmware Interface (UEFI) (the default) boot mode is an enhanced 64-bit boot interface. If you have configured your system to boot to UEFI mode, it replaces the system BIOS.
- 1 From the **System Setup Main Menu**, click **Boot Settings**, and select **Boot Mode**.
- 2 Select the boot mode you want the system to boot into.
 - CAUTION: Switching the boot mode may prevent the system from booting if the operating system is not installed in the same boot mode.
- 3 After the system boots in the specified boot mode, proceed to install your operating system from that mode.

(i) NOTE:

- Operating systems must be UEFI-compatible to be installed from the UEFI boot mode. DOS and 32-bit operating systems do not support UEFI and can only be installed from the BIOS boot mode.
- · For the latest information about supported operating systems, go to Dell.com/ossupport.

Entering System Setup

- 1 Turn on, or restart your system.
- 2 Press F2 immediately after you see the following message:

F2 = System Setup

If your operating system begins to load before you press F2, wait for the system to finish booting, and then restart your system and try again.

Responding to error messages

If an error message is displayed while the system is booting, make a note of the message. For more information, see System Error Messages.

(i) NOTE: After installing a memory upgrade, it is normal for your system to display a message the first time you start your system.

Using the system setup navigation keys

Up arrow Moves to the previous field.

<Enter> Allows you to type in a value in the selected field (if applicable) or follow the link in the field.

Spacebar Expands or collapses a drop-down menu, if applicable.

Moves to the next field.

<Tab> Moves to the next focus area.

<Esc> Moves to the previous page till you view the main screen. Pressing **<Esc>** in the main screen displays a

message that prompts you to save any unsaved changes and restarts the system.

<F1> Displays the System Setup help file.

NOTE: For most of the options, any changes that you make are recorded but do not take effect until you restart the system.

System BIOS screen

(i) NOTE: The options for System Setup change based on the system configuration.

1 NOTE: System Setup defaults are listed under their respective options in the following sections, where applicable.

Menu Item	Description
System Information	Displays information about the system such as the system model name, BIOS version, Service Tag, and so on.
Memory Settings	Displays information and options related to installed memory.
Processor Settings	Displays information and options related to the processor such as speed, cache size, and so on.
SATA Settings	Displays options to enable or disable the integrated SATA controller and ports.
Boot Settings	Displays options to specify the boot mode (BIOS or UEFI). Enables you to modify UEFI and BIOS boot settings.
Integrated Devices	Displays options to enable or disable integrated device controllers and ports, and to specify related features and options.
Serial Communication	Displays options to enable or disable the serial ports and specify related features and options.
System Profile Settings	Displays options to change the processor power management settings, memory frequency, and so on.
System Security	Displays options to configure the system security settings like, system password, setup password, TPM security, and so on. It also enables or disables support for local BIOS update, the power and NMI buttons on the system.
Miscellaneous Settings	Displays options to change the system date, time, and so on.

System information screen

You can use the System Information screen to view system properties such as Service Tag, system model name, and the BIOS version.

To view the System Information screen, click System Setup Main Menu > System BIOS > System Information.

The **System Information** screen details are explained as follows:

Memory Settings screen

Menu Item Description

System Memory Displays the amount of memory installed in the system.

Size

System Memory Displays the type of memory installed in the system.

Video Memory Displays the amount of video memory.

System Memory Specifies whether system memory tests are run during system boot. Options are **Enabled** and **Disabled**. By

default, the **System Memory Testing** option is set to **Disabled**.

Specifies the memory operating mode. The options available are **Optimizer Mode**, **Advanced ECC Mode**, **Mirror Mode**, **Spare Mode**, **Spare with Advanced ECC Mode**, and **Dell Fault Resilient Mode**. By default, the **Memory Operating Mode** option is set to **Optimizer Mode**.

NOTE: The Memory Operating Mode can have different defaults and available options based on the memory configuration of your system.

NOTE: The Dell Fault Resilient Mode establishes an area of memory that is fault resilient. This mode can be used by an operating system that supports the feature to load critical applications or enables the operating system kernel to maximize system availability.

Node Interleaving If this field is **Enabled**, memory interleaving is supported if a symmetric memory configuration is installed. If

Disabled, the system supports Non-Uniform Memory architecture (NUMA) (asymmetric) memory configurations.

NOTE: The QPI speed option displays only when both the processors are installed.

Alternate RTID (Requestor Transaction ID) Setting

Allows you to allocate more RTIDs to the remote socket increasing cache performance between the sockets or work in normal mode for NUMA. By default, the Alternate RTID (Requestor Transaction ID) Setting is set to

Virtualization Technology

Allows you to enable or disable the additional hardware capabilities provided for virtualization. By default, the Virtualization Technology option is set to Enabled.

System and setup password features

You can create a system password and a setup password to secure your system. To enable creation of the system and setup password, the password jumper must be set to enabled. For more information on the password jumper settings, see System Board Jumper Settings.

System password This is the password that you must enter before you can boot your system.

Setup password This is the password that you must enter to access and make changes to the BIOS or UEFI settings of your

system.

CAUTION: Avoid leaving your system running and unattended. Enabling the password feature provides a basic level of security for the data on your system.

i NOTE: Your system is shipped with the system and setup password feature disabled.

Assigning a system and setup password

The password jumper enables or disables the System Password and Setup Password features. For more information on the password jumper settings, see System board jumper settings. .

(i) NOTE:

You can assign a new System Password or Setup Password or change an existing System Password or Setup Password only when the password jumper setting is enabled and **Password Status** is set to **Unlocked**. If the Password Status is set to **Locked**, you cannot change the System Password or Setup Password.

If the password jumper setting is disabled, the existing System Password and Setup Password is deleted and you need not provide the system password to boot the system.

A message prompts you to re-enter the system password.

- 6 Re-enter the system password and click **OK**.
- 7 Select **Setup Password**, enter your system password and press Enter or Tab.

A message prompts you to re-enter the setup password.

8 Re-enter the setup password click **OK**.

- 9 Press Esc to return to the System BIOS screen. Press Esc again, and a message prompts you to save the changes.
 - ONOTE: Password protection does not take effect until the system reboots.

Deleting or changing system password and setup password

Ensure that the password jumper is **Enabled** and the **Password Status** is set to **Unlocked** before attempting to delete or change the existing system or setup password.

- (i) NOTE: You cannot delete or change an existing system or setup password if the Password Status is set to Locked.

- In the **Setup Password** field, alter or delete the existing setup password, and then press Enter or Tab.

 If you change the system and setup password a message prompts you to reenter the new password. If you delete the system and setup password, a message prompts you to confirm the deletion.
- 6 Press Esc to return to the System BIOS screen. Press Esc again, and a message prompts you to save the changes.
- 7 Select **Setup Password**, change or delete the existing setup password and press **Enter** or **Tab**.
 - NOTE: If you change the system password or setup password, a message prompts you to reenter the new password. If you delete the system password or setup password, a message prompts you to confirm the deletion.

Using your system password to secure your system

If you have assigned a setup password, the system accepts your setup password as an alternate system password.

- 1 Turn on or reboot your system.
- 2 Type the system password and press Enter.

When Password Status is set to Locked, type the system password and press Enter when prompted at reboot.

NOTE: If an incorrect system password is typed, the system displays a message and prompts you to reenter your password. You have three attempts to type the correct password. After the third unsuccessful attempt, the system displays an error message that the system has stopped functioning and must be turned off. Even after you turn off and restart the system, the error message is displayed until the correct password is entered.

Operating with a setup password enabled

If Setup Password is set to Enabled, type the correct setup password before modifying the system setup options.

If you do not type the correct password in three attempts, the system displays the following message:

Invalid Password! Number of unsuccessful password attempts: <x> System Halted! Must power down.

Even after you turn off and restart the system, the error message is displayed until the correct password is typed. The following options are exceptions:

If System Password is not set to Enabled and is not locked through the Password Status option, you can assign a system password.
 For more information, see the System Security Settings screen section.

- · You cannot disable or change an existing system password.
- NOTE: You can use the password status option with the setup password option to protect the system password from unauthorized changes.

Entering the UEFI boot manager

NOTE: Operating systems must be 64-bit UEFI-compatible (for example, Microsoft Windows Server 2008 x64 version) to be installed from the UEFI boot mode. DOS and 32-bit operating systems can only be installed from the BIOS boot mode.

Front bezel (optional)

The front bezel is attached to the front side of the system and prevents accidents while removing the hard drive or when pressing the reset or power button. The front bezel can also be locked for additional security.

Removing the front bezel

- 1 Unlock the keylock at the left end of the bezel.
- 2 Lift the release latch next to the keylock.
- 3 Rotate the left end of the bezel away from the front panel.
- 4 Unhook the right end of the bezel and pull the bezel away from the system.




Figure 10. Removing and installing the front bezel

Installing the front bezel

System cover

- (i) NOTE: It is recommended that you always use an antistatic mat and antistatic strap while working on components inside the system.
- 1 Turn off the system and attached peripherals, and disconnect the system from the electrical outlet.




Figure 11. Opening and closing the system

Closing the system




Figure 12. Inside the system—8 hard drive system




Figure 13. Inside the system—10 hard drive system

Cooling shroud

The cooling shroud aerodynamically directs the airflow across the entire system. The airflow passes through all the critical parts of the system, where the vacuum pulls air across the entire surface area of the heat sink, thus allowing increased cooling.

Removing the cooling shroud




Figure 14. Removing and installing the cooling shroud

System memory

Your system supports DDR3 unbuffered ECC DIMMs (ECC UDIMMs), registered DIMMs (RDIMMs), and load reduced DIMMs (LRDIMMs). It supports DDR3 and DDR3L voltage specifications.

i NOTE: MT/s indicates DIMM speed in MegaTransfers per second.

Memory bus operating frequency can be 1866 MT/s, 1600 MT/s, 1333 MT/s, 1066 MT/s, or 800 MT/s depending on:

- DIMM type (UDIMM, RDIMM, or LRDIMM)
- DIMM configuration (number of ranks)
- · maximum frequency of the DIMMs
- · number of DIMMs populated per channel
- DIMM operating voltage
- · system profile selected (for example, Performance Optimized, Custom, or Dense Configuration Optimized)
- · maximum supported DIMM frequency of the processors

The system contains 24 memory sockets split into two sets of 12 sockets, one set per processor. Each 12-socket set is organized into four channels. In each channel, the release levers of the first socket are marked white, the second socket black, and the third socket green.

(i) NOTE: DIMMs in sockets A1 to A12 are assigned to processor 1 and DIMMs in sockets B1 to B12 are assigned to processor 2.




Figure 15. Memory socket locations

General Memory Module Installation Guidelines

This system supports Flexible Memory Configuration, enabling the system to be configured and run in any valid chipset architectural configuration. The following are the recommended guidelines for best performance:

- · UDIMMs, RDIMMs, and LRDIMMs must not be mixed.
- · x4 and x8 DRAM based DIMMs can be mixed. For more information, see Mode-Specific Guidelines.
- · A maximum of two UDIMMs can be populated in a channel.
- Up to two quad-rank RDIMMs and up to three dual- or single-rank RDIMMs can be populated per channel. When a quad-rank RDIMM is populated in the first slot with white release levers, the third DIMM slot in the channel with green release levers cannot be populated.
- · Up to three LRDIMMs can be populated regardless of rank count.
- Populate DIMM sockets only if a processor is installed. For single-processor systems, sockets A1 to A12 are available. For dual-processor systems, sockets A1 to A12 and sockets B1 to B12 are available.
- Populate all sockets with white release tabs first, then black, and then green.
- Do not populate the third DIMM socket in a channel with green release tabs, if a quad-rank RDIMM is populated in the first socket with white release tabs.
- Populate the sockets by highest rank count in the following order first in sockets with white release levers, then black, and then
 green. For example, if you want to mix quad-rank and dual-rank DIMMs, populate quad-rank DIMMs in the sockets with white release
 tabs and dual-rank DIMMs in the sockets with black release tabs.
- In a dual-processor configuration, the memory configuration for each processor should be identical. For example, if you populate socket A1 for processor 1, then populate socket B1 for processor 2, and so on.
- Memory modules of different sizes can be mixed provided that other memory population rules are followed (for example, 2 GB and 4 GB memory modules can be mixed).
- Populate four DIMMs per processor (one DIMM per channel) at a time to maximize performance.
- · If memory modules with different speeds are installed, they will operate at the speed of the slowest installed memory module(s) or slower depending on system DIMM configuration.

Mode-specific guidelines

Four memory channels are allocated to each processor. The possible configurations depend on the memory mode selected.

(independent channel) mode. x8 DRAM based DIMMs require Advanced ECC mode to gain SDDC.

The following sections provide additional slot population guidelines for each mode.

Advanced Error Correction Code

Advanced Error Correction Code (ECC) mode extends SDDC from x4 DRAM based DIMMs to both x4 and x8 DRAMs. This protects against single DRAM chip failures during normal operation.

The installation guidelines for memory modules are as follows:

- · Memory modules must be identical in size, speed, and technology.
- DIMMs installed in memory sockets with white release levers must be identical and the same rule applies for sockets with black release levers. This ensures that identical DIMMs are installed in matched pair —for example, A1 with A2, A3 with A4, A5 with A6, and so on.

Memory optimized independent channel mode

This mode supports Single Device Data Correction (SDDC) only for memory modules that use x4 device width. It does not impose any specific slot population requirements.

Memory sparing

(i) NOTE: To use memory sparing, this feature must be enabled in System Setup.

In this mode, one rank per channel is reserved as a spare. If persistent correctable errors are detected on a rank, the data from this rank is copied to the spare rank, and the failed rank is disabled.

With memory sparing enabled, the system memory available to the operating system is reduced by one rank per channel. For example, in a dual-processor configuration with sixteen 4 GB single-rank memory modules, the available system memory is: 3/4 (ranks/channel) \times 16 (memory modules) \times 4 GB = 48 GB, and not 16 (memory modules) \times 4 GB = 64 GB.

- (i) NOTE: Memory sparing does not offer protection against a multi-bit uncorrectable error.
- NOTE: Both Advanced ECC/Lockstep and Optimizer modes support memory sparing.

Memory mirroring

Memory mirroring offers the strongest memory module reliability mode compared to all other modes, providing improved uncorrectable multi-bit failure protection. In a mirrored configuration, the total available system memory is one half of the total installed physical memory. Half of the installed memory is used to mirror the active memory modules. In the event of an uncorrectable error, the system switches over to the mirrored copy. This ensures SDDC and multi-bit protection.

The installation guidelines for memory modules are as follows:

· Memory modules must be identical in size, speed, and technology.

 Memory modules installed in memory module sockets with white release levers must be identical and the same rule applies for sockets with black and green release tabs. This ensures that identical memory modules are installed in matched pairs—for example, A1 with A2, A3 with A4, A5 with A6, and so on.




Figure 16. Ejecting The Memory Module




Figure 17. Removing The Memory Module




Figure 18. Installing The Memory Module

Hard drives

All hard drives connect to the system board through the hard drive backplane. Hard drives are supplied in hot swappable hard drive carriers that fit in the hard drive slots.

- CAUTION: Before attempting to remove or install a hard drive while the system is running, see the documentation for the storage controller card to ensure that the host adapter is configured correctly to support hot swappable hard drive removal and insertion.
- CAUTION: Do not turn off or reboot your system while the hard drive is being formatted. Doing so can cause a hard drive failure.

When you format a hard drive, allow enough time for the formatting to be completed. High-capacity hard drives can take several hours to format.




Figure 19. Removing and Installing a 2.5 Inch Hard-Drive Blank




Figure 20. Removing and Installing a Hot-Swap Hard Drive

Installing a hot swappable hard drive or solid state drive

- △ | CAUTION: Use only hard drives that have been tested and approved for use with the hard drive backplane.




Figure 21. Installing a hot-swappable hard drive or SSD




Figure 22. Removing and Installing a Hard Drive Into a Hard-Drive Carrier




Figure 23. Installing a hard drive into a hard drive carrier




Figure 24. Removing and installing the optical drive




Figure 25. Removing and installing a cooling fan




Figure 26. Replacing the Internal USB Key




Figure 27. Removing and installing the expansion card




Figure 28. Installing an expansion card




Figure 29. Removing and installing the expansion card riser 1




Figure 30. Removing and installing the expansion card riser 3




Figure 31. Removing and installing the sd vflash card




Figure 32. Removing and installing the internal dual sd module




Figure 33. Removing the integrated storage controller




Figure 34. Removing and installing the network daughter card




Figure 35. Removing and installing the heat sink




Figure 36. Processor shield opening and closing lever sequence




Figure 37. Removing and installing a processor




Figure 38. Removing and Installing an AC Power Supply




Figure 39. Assembling and Connecting the Safety Ground Wire




Figure 40. Assembling the DC Input Power Wires




Figure 41. Removing and Installing a DC Power Supply




Figure 42. Removing and Installing the Power Supply Blank




Figure 43. Removing the system battery cover




Figure 44. Replacing the system battery




Figure 45. Removing and installing the 2.5 inch (x4) hard-drive backplane




Figure 46. Cabling diagram—2.5 inch (x4) systems




Figure 47. Removing and installing the 2.5 inch (x4 sas hard-drive and x2 dell poweredge express flash [pcie ssd]) backplane




Figure 48. Cabling diagram—systems with the 2.5 inch (x4 sas and x2 pcie ssd) hard-drive backplane




Figure 49. Removing and installing the 2.5 inch (x8) hard-drive backplane




Figure 50. Cabling diagram—2.5 inch (x8) systems




Figure 51. Cabling diagram—2.5 inch (x8) systems




Figure 52. Removing and installing the 2.5 inch (x10) hard-drive backplane




Figure 53. Cabling diagram—2.5 inch (x10) systems




Figure 54. Removing and installing the control panel board




Figure 55. Removing and installing the control panel




Figure 56. Removing and installing the control panel




Figure 57. Removing and installing the vga module






Figure 58. Removing and installing the system board

Troubleshooting system startup failure

If you boot the system to the BIOS boot mode after installing an operating system from the UEFI Boot Manager, the system stops responding. The vice-versa is also true. You must boot to the same boot mode in which you installed the operating system.

For all other startup issues, note the system messages that appear on the screen.

Troubleshooting external connections

Ensure that all external cables are securely attached to the external connectors on your system before troubleshooting any external devices.




Figure 59. System board connectors and jumpers

Disabling forgotten password

LCD Message Intrusion detected. Check chassis cover.

Details The chassis is open. System performance may be degraded, and security may be

compromised.

Action Close the chassis. Check system logs.

SEC0033

Message The chassis is open while the power is off.

LCD Message Intrusion detected. Check chassis cover.

Details The chassis was opened while the power was off. System security may have been

compromised.

Action Close the chassis and verify hardware inventory. Check system logs.

SEL0006

Message All event logging is disabled.

Details This message is displayed when all event logging has been disabled by the user.

Action If unintended, re-enable logging.

SEL0008

Message Log is full.

Details When the event log is full, additional events are not written to the log. Older events may

be overwritten and lost. This message may also appear if the user disabled event logging.

Action Backup and clear log.

SEL0012

Message Could not create or initialize the system event log.

Details If the system event log fails to initialize, platform status and failure events are not

captured. Some management software do not report platform exceptions.

Action Reboot the management controller or iDRAC. Cycle system input power. If problem

persists call support.

SEL1204

Message An unknown system hardware failure detected.

LCD Message Unknown system hardware failure.

Details If the system event log failed to initialize, platform status and failure events are not

captured. Some management software do not report platform exceptions.

Message The system inlet temperature is less than the lower warning threshold.
