


How to paint a DIY Geometric Painting with Metallic Acrylic



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

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1. Marking up the canvas

Although the marking up is quite easy one must take care to make any measurements exact. The steps are as follows:

1) Create a vertical line centrally down the canvas.

2) Create a horizontal line centrally across the canvas.

3) Lay a protractor on top of the horizontal line and mark to 30 degree marks to the horizontal line.


4) Use a rule to lay in two lines at 30 degrees to each other. We will call these the key lines.

5) Lay a series of parallel lines with a rule emitting from each 30 degree key line.




In this project I have used a 60 × 60cm Canvas. But a canvas of any size could be used. So to the width between parallel lines will dictate the size of the blocks on the work and can be of any size, just ensure the angles are correct at 30 degrees.







All the paints that will be used are from the Metallic Acrylic Intro Set. The first colour to lay down is the Bronze. This colour lies in the topside of the block and I'm using a #12 angle to apply the paint as the acute corner allows for precision application. To avoid any confusion draw in the vertical lines from the bronze coat.



3. Laying in Gold

The Gold occupies the left side of the block.



Metallic paint is a little different from normal paint as it contains mice in it to reflect the light. Mica is a naturally occurring mineral and doesn't have the covering power of standard paint so it may be necessary to let the first coat dry and then give it a light second coat to increase opacity.





4. Laying on the Silver

The third colour is Silver and it occupies the right side of the block. Silver is the lightest tone so it is a good idea to remove any guide lines on the canvas as they may be visible beneath the silver coat. If you choose to do this it is best to use an Electric Eraser to remove them.



5. Painting the edge of the canvas

The final step is to paint the edge of the canvas to clean it up. I have used Lamp Black Satin Acrylic to do this and I have applied it with a 100mm sponge roller.



Whilst this lesson is quite simple, it is a good idea to watch the lesson video thoroughly to familiarize yourself with the initial marking up stage .
