

Free Knitting Pattern LION BRAND® FEELS LIKE HEAVEN

CLARABELLE STRIPED SCARF

Pattern Number: M21039 FLH



SKILL LEVEL – EASY

SIZES

About 7 1/2 x 66 1/2 in. (19 x 169 cm), not including fringe

MATERIALS

LION BRAND® FEELS LIKE HEAVEN (Art. #152)

#141 Mauve 1 ball (A)

#100 White 1 ball (B)

#157 Sunny 1 ball (C)

#145 Periwinkle 1 ball (D)

#122 Beige 1 ball (E)

LION BRAND® large-eyed blunt needle



ADDITIONAL MATERIALS

Circular needle size 7 (4.5 mm), 29 in. (73.5 cm) long or longer

GAUGE

18 sts + 36 rows = about 4 in. (10 cm) in pattern of Rows 5-8. BE SURE TO CHECK YOUR GAUGE.

STITCH EXPLANATON

yo (yarn over)

An increase that also creates a small decorative hole (eyelet) in the fabric, worked as follows:

- 1. Bring yarn to front, between the needles.
- 2. Take yarn to back, over the right needle. This creates the new st. You are now ready to proceed with the next st as instructed.

NOTES

- 1. Scarf is worked back and forth in rows lengthwise.
- 2. Yarn color is changed every 4 rows to form a total of 17 stripes. The first and last stripes are worked with E. The 15 stripes between the first and last stripe are worked following Stripe Sequence. When changing yarn color, leave long beg and ending yarn tails as instructed.
- 3. Designer recommends a chain or crochet cast on.
- 4. All slipped stitches are slipped as if to purl.
- 5. With yarn in front (wyif) refers to the side of the work facing you as you work the row; with yarn in back (wyib) refers to the side of the work that is away from you as you work the row.

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- 6. To move yarn from front to back or back to front, bring yarn between needles. Take care not to wrap yarn over a needle, this could create an additional st.
- 7. Circular needle is used to accommodate stitches. Work back and forth in rows on circular needle as if working with straight needles.

STRIPE SEQUENCE

Work 4 rows with D, 4 rows with B, 4 rows with A, 4 rows with C, 4 rows with A, 4 rows with D, 4 rows with D, 4 rows with B, 4 rows with A, 4 rows with C, 4 rows with A, 4 rows with B, and 4 rows with D, for a total of 15 stripes in Stripe Sequence.

SCARF

With E, leaving a 7 in. (18 cm) yarn tail, cast on 300 sts.

Row 1: Knit.

Row 2: SI 1 wyif, move yarn to back, k to last st, move yarn to front, sI 1 wyif.

Row 3 (Eyelet Row): K1, yo, k2tog, k to last 2 sts, yo, k2tog.

Row 4: Rep Row 2.

Cut E, leaving a 7 in. (18 cm) tail.

Work in Stripe Sequence

Change to D, leaving a 7 in. (18 cm) beg yarn tail.

Row 5: Knit.

Row 6: SI 1 wyif, move yarn to back, k to last st, sI 1 wyib.

Row 7 (Eyelet Row): P2tog, yo, p to last 3 sts, p2tog, yo, p1.

Row 8: Sl 1 wyib, k to last st, sl 1 wyib.

Cut D, leaving a 7 in. (18 cm) tail.

Rep Rows 5-8, continuing to change yarn color following Stripe Sequence and leaving yarn tails as instructed, until all 60 rows of Sequence have been completed and there are a total of 16 stripes.

Change to E, leaving a 7 in. (18 cm) beg tail.

With E, rep Rows 1-4.

Bind off and cut yarn, leaving a 7 in. (18 cm) tail.

FINISHING

Block to measurements.

Fringe

For each eyelet along short edges of Scarf that does not have yarn tails still attached, cut 4 strands of matching yarn about 14 in. (35.5 cm) long. Hold the 4 strands of yarn together and fold in half. Thread fold through eyelet, forming a loop. Pull ends of fringe through this loop. Pull to tighten.

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For each eyelet along short edges of Scarf with yarn tails still attached, cut 3 strands of matching yarn about 14 in. (35. cm) long. Hold the 3 strands of yarn together and fold in half. Thread fold through eyelet, forming a loop. Pull ends of fringe and the yarn tails through the loop. Pull to tighten.

Make 17 fringe along each short edge of Scarf with a total of 4 strands of yarn in each fringe.

Trim fringe evenly.
