- 16 x 2.5-inch SAS/ SATA drives
- 8 x 3.5-inch SAS/ SATA drives




Figure 3. Front view of the 8 x 3.5-inch drive system




Figure 7. Rear view of the system




Figure 8. Inside the system

Locating the Express Service Code and Service Tag

The unique Express Service Code and Service Tag are used to identify the system.

The information tag is located on the front of the system that includes system information such as the Service Tag, Express Service Code, Manufacture date, NIC, MAC address, QRL label, and so on. If you have opted for the secure default access to iDRAC, the Information tag also contains the iDRAC secure default password. If you have opted for iDRAC Quick Sync 2, the Information tag also contains the OpenManage Mobile (OMM) label, where administrators can configure, monitor, and troubleshoot the PowerEdge servers.




Figure 9. Locating the Express Service Code and Service tag

The Mini Enterprise Service Tag (MEST) label is located on the rear of the system that includes the Service Tag (ST), Express Service Code (Exp Svc Code), and Manufacture Date (Mfg. Date). The Exp Svc Code is used by Dell EMC to route support calls to the appropriate personnel.

Alternatively, the Service Tag information is located on a label on the left wall of the chassis.

The system information label is located on back of the system cover.




Figure 10. Service information




Figure 11. Service information




Figure 12. Memory information




Figure 13. Configuration and layout






Figure 14. Configuration and layout

Figure 16. System tasks




Figure 17. Express service tag

Setting up the system

iDRAC configuration

The Integrated Dell Remote Access Controller (iDRAC) is designed to make you more productive as a system administrator and improve the overall availability of Dell EMC servers. iDRAC alerts you to system issues, helps you to perform remote management, and reduces the need for physical access to the system.

Options to set up iDRAC IP address

To enable communication between your system and iDRAC, you must first configure the network settings based on your network infrastructure. The network settings option is set to **DHCP**, by default.

(i) NOTE: For static IP configuration, you must request for the settings at the time of purchase.

- One memory module (DIMM) installed in the socket A1

Configuration validation

The new generation of PowerEdge systems have added interconnect flexibility and advanced iDRAC management features to collect precise system configuration information and report configuration errors.

When the system is powered on, information about installed cables, backplanes, floating card (fPERClike BOSS), and processor is obtained from the CPLD and backplane memory maps is analyzed. This information forms a unique configuration, which is compared with one of the qualified configurations stored in a table maintained by iDRAC.

One or more sensors are assigned to each of the configuration elements. During POST, any configuration validation error is logged in the System Event Log (SEL)/LifeCycle (LC) log. The reported events are categorized in the configuration validation error table.




Figure 22. Removing the drive backplane cover




Figure 23. Installing the drive backplane cover




Figure 24. Removing the air shroud




Figure 25. Installing the air shroud




Figure 26. Removing the cooling fan cage assembly




Figure 27. Installing the cooling fan cage assembly




Figure 28. Removing a cooling fan




Figure 29. Installing a cooling fan




Figure 30. Removing the side wall bracket




Figure 31. Installing the side wall bracket




Figure 32. Removing the intrusion switch module




Figure 33. Installing the intrusion switch




Figure 34. Removing the Serial COM port




Figure 35. Installing the Serial COM port




Figure 42. 16x 2.5-inch SAS/SATA backplane




Figure 43. 8 x 2.5-inch drive backplane




Figure 44. 8x 3.5-inch drive backplane




Figure 45. Removing the drive backplane




Figure 46. Installing the drive backplane




Figure 47. 8 x 2.5-inch SAS/SATA




Figure 48. 8 x 3.5-inch SAS/SATA




Figure 49. 16 x 2.5-inch SAS/SATA




Figure 50. ODD and no PERC configuration




Figure 51. VGA and Control Panel




Figure 52. Memory channels

General memory module installation guidelines

To ensure optimal performance of your system, observe the following general guidelines when configuring your system memory. If your system's memory configurations fail to observe these guidelines, your system might not boot, stop responding during memory configuration, or operate with reduced memory.

The memory bus may operate at speeds of 2933 MT/s depending on the following factors:

- System profile selected (for example, Performance Optimized, or Custom [can be run at high speed or lower])
- Maximum supported DIMM speed of the processors
- Maximum supported speed of the DIMMs

(i) NOTE: MT/s indicates DIMM speed in MegaTransfers per second.

The system supports Flexible Memory Configuration, enabling the system to be configured and run in any valid chipset architectural configuration. The following are the recommended guidelines for installing memory modules:

- All DIMMs must be DDR4.
- x4 and x8 DRAM based memory modules can be mixed.
- If memory modules with different speeds are installed, they operate at the speed of the slowest installed memory module(s).
- Populate memory module sockets only if a processor is installed.
- For single-processor systems, sockets A1 to A8 are available.
 - For dual-processor systems, sockets A1 to A8 and sockets B1 to B8 are available.

• In **Optimizer Mode**, the DRAM controllers operate independently in the 64-bit mode and provide optimized memory performance.




Figure 53. Removing a memory module




Figure 54. Installing a memory module




Figure 55. Loosening the nuts and setting the anti-tilt wires to the unlock position




Figure 56. Removing a processor heat sink




Figure 57. Lift up the TIM break lever




Figure 58. Aligning pin 1 marks of processor with tray




Figure 59. Removing the retaining clip




Figure 60. Installing the processor bracket




Figure 61. Press the retaining clip on the four sides




Figure 64. Installing the heat sink onto the processor




Figure 65. Installing the processor heat sink module




Figure 66. Setting the anti-tilt wires to the locked position and tighten the nuts




Figure 67. Expansion card slot connectors




Figure 68. Removing the expansion card




Figure 69. Installing the filler bracket




Figure 70. Removing the filler bracket




Figure 71. Installing the expansion card




Figure 72. Removing the IDSDM module




Figure 73. Installing the IDSDM module




Figure 74. Removing the BOSS S2 card carrier




Figure 76. Disconnecting the BOSS power cable and signal cable





Figure 77. Removing the BOSS S2 module




Figure 79. Removing the BOSS cover




Figure 80. Installing the BOSS cover




Figure 81. Connecting the BOSS power cable and BOSS Signal cable to the BOSS S2 module




Figure 82. Installing the BOSS S2 module




Figure 83. Connecting the BOSS power cable and signal cable




Figure 85. Installing the BOSS S2 card carrier




Figure 86. Removing the front mounting front PERC module




Figure 87. Installing the front mounting front PERC module




Figure 88. Removing the OCP shroud






Figure 90. Removing the OCP card






Figure 92. Removing the system battery




Figure 93. Installing the system battery




Figure 94. Removing the internal USB card




Figure 95. Installing the internal USB card




Figure 96. Removing the MicroSD card




Figure 97. Installing the MicroSD card

Your system supports the hot spare feature that significantly reduces the power overhead associated with the power supply unit (PSU) redundancy.

When the hot spare feature is enabled, one of the redundant PSUs is switched to the sleep state. The active PSU supports 100 percent of the system load, thus operating at higher efficiency. The PSU in the sleep state monitors output voltage of the active PSU. If the output voltage of the active PSU drops, the PSU in the sleep state returns to an active output state.

If having both PSUs active is more efficient than having one PSU in the sleep state, the active PSU can also activate the sleeping PSU.

The default PSU settings are as follows:

- If the load on the active PSU is more than 50 percent of PSU rated power wattage, then the redundant PSU is switched to the active state.
- If the load on the active PSU falls below 20 percent of PSU rated power wattage, then the redundant PSU is switched to the sleep state.




Figure 102. Removing the power interposer board




Figure 103. Installing the power interposer board




Figure 104. Removing the cooling fan cage board.




Figure 105. Installing the cooling fan cage board




Figure 107. Installing the system board




Figure 109. Removing the left control panel






Figure 111. Removing the right control panel




Figure 112. Installing the right control panel




Figure 113. Removing the ODD




Figure 114. Installing the ODD



NIC indicator codes

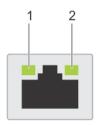


Figure 119. NIC indicator codes
